

### Step 1: Select Target Offense

Review of recent trends for Part I offenses to determine which offenses has the largest increase in frequency (traditionally homicides, aggravated assaults, armed robberies, etc.)

Review five year trends for this offense

Location mapping of offenses

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# Step 2: Group Mapping

#### Collect crime data

- Convene experienced front-line officer and probation officers
- Identify violent groups based on their knowledge
- Identify turf (areas of operation)
- Estimate numbers in each group
- Produce a list of violent groups, their networks, alliances, and beefs



## Step 3: Incident Review

Review a number of robbery incidents to gather insight about the problem

- Examine the arrest data
- Gather information available about location, weapon type, criminal history of offender/victim, probation status, etc.

Convene experienced front-line officers and probation officers to discover what they know about these offenses and those involved. Motives, context, offender narrative, etc.

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### Step 4: Initial "Demonstration"

#### Select a "standout" violent group

- Identify members, especially "impact players", usually on the basis of up to date front line information
- Assess individuals' legal vulnerabilities
- Frame interagency enforcement plan focusing directly on group members
- Implement, ideally with a high profile sweep, arrests, warrant service, etc.

Survey front line troops to ID group members
Review existing information (gang data bases, case files, field sheets, etc)

- If necessary, conduct surveillance or deploy informants
- Provide list to Probation to identify which group members are currently under supervision
- Create a list with 1-3 members of each group on probation

Identify social service providers who can provide assistance to group members

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- Obtain commitment to give rapid, priority attention to group members
- Create "one stop" entryway for group members (Resource Coordinator?)

Obtain the commitment of the High Point Community Against Violence (HPCAV)



Identify community figures willing to articulate key community standards

- Violence is wrong
- There is no excuse
- You are doing enormous damage to yourselves, your families, your community
- You are better than this
- We care about you, need you, and want to help
- Challenge the street code: it's not OK to go to prison, it's not OK to die, it's not OK to hurt someone, your boys won't have your back



### Step 8: Call-in/Notification

Face-to-face message with offenders (gangs), community (HPCAV), and law enforcement (VCTF)

- Strong community message, "we are not going to tolerate the violence any longer and we know who is behind the gang violence"
- Law enforcement message says "there is a clear standard and the group will be punished if it is violated"
- Help is offered through a resource coordinator



### **Operational Phases**

#### INDENTIFICATION PHASE

- Unpack robbery reports
- Survey officers to ID most active groups and individuals
- Compile arrest data
- Create master list
- ID individuals in each group already on probation


#### NOTIFICATION PHASE

 Call-in representatives from each group

- Deliver message to take back to group
- message delivered is "every member of the group will be targeted and sanctioned if any member commits a robbery"


#### ENFORCEMENT / RESOURCE DELIVERY PHASE

- Major case review of any robbery to ID group involved
- Prosecution and focused deterrence on entire group
- Community delivers resources
- Communicate enforcement actions to the group at large





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


#### **Aggravated Assaults**










# What Does the Arrest Data Tell Us About the Offenders?




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### 5 Year Robbery Trend





#### High Point 15 Year Violent Crime Trend

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
### Why Consider Reorganization?

- Make the structure support the mission.
- Institutionalize our focused deterrence philosophy.
- Raise the level of accountability to highest rank.
- Formalize major case reviews and our response to violence.
- Align all units involved in intelligence gathering, data analysis, strategic planning, and coordination with our VCTF partners under one chain of command.






- Make our structure support our primary mission, which is to reduce violent crime. Institutionalize what we say we do. Be able to push the envelope and try new experiments.
- Who is looking at the big picture? Who is studying the relationships between repeat offenders and violent crime trends? Who is looking at the data? Researching what we learned.
- Almost all violent crime involves persons crimes, drugs, guns and groups. Those Units directly involved with reducing violent crime are in different Divisions.
- Formalize our major case review and response to acts of violence.





#### Why Consider Organizational Realignment?

- To facilitate our intelligence gathering, data analysis, strategic planning, implementation, coordination with our VCTF partners and to have multiple units responsible for violent crime reduction rather than one.
- Involve investigators in deterrence and prevention, as well as detection and arrest. A more comprehensive approach to violence reduction. Apply the logic model we perfected on drug markets to other violent behaviors.
- Preserve the North/South geographic accountability for the majors but add Violent Crime Reduction accountability to a major.
- All three majors are involved in crime fighting. Administrative duties should be spread among the majors eliminating the need for a purely Administrative Division.
